## What is a School-Parent Compact?

A *School-Parent Compact for Achievement* is an agreement that parents, students and teachers develop together. It explains how parents and teachers will collaborate to make sure all students reach or exceed grade-level standards.

This compact:

- Links to goals of the school improvement plan
- Focuses on student skill mastery
- Describes how teachers will help students develop those skills using high-quality curriculum and instruction
- Shares strategies parents can use at home
- Explain how teachers and parents will communicate about student progress
- Describes opportunities for parents to volunteer, observe, and participate in the classroom

## Jointly Developed

The parents, students and staff of **AAA** School meet annually to discuss student learning needs based on current grade-level data. Our School-Parent Compact for Achievement is revised based on these discussions. Teachers suggested home learning strategies, parents added ideas to make them more specific and students identified ways to support the learning goals.

## Activities to Build Partnerships

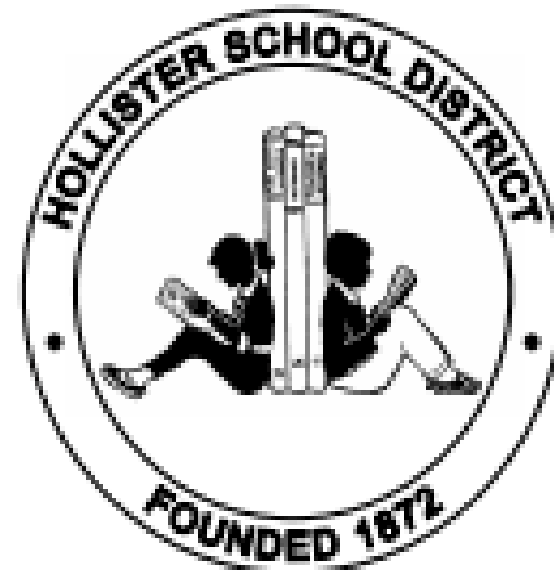
- The staff at **AAA** School will provide an annual information meeting at the start of the school year, to inform the parents of students in the Title I program of their right to be involved.

## Communication about Student Learning

- Parent-Teacher conferences in November and March (Grades 4/5)
- Classroom visits

- *Provide parents with frequent reports of student progress*
- *Provide parents with reasonable access to staff. (Hold meetings at times convenient to the parent, via telephone calls and e-mail.)*
- *Provide parents with opportunities to earn their **20 volunteer hours** and participate in their child's class and to observe classroom activities.*
- *Work towards their Service Learning Project completion.*
